Prospective map of IHHN Pediatric Oncology Outreach Network in Sindh





Whispers of Hope

In the remote reaches of Balochistan lived little Hamid, the 2-year-old son of a coal mine laborer, who lived with his 6 siblings dwelling in a two-room house, still bearing scars from the 2022 floods. His father, Akbar, worked tirelessly from dawn till dusk, bringing back meals some days and empty hands on others. One day, Hamid suddenly got very sick with a high fever and fatigue, symptoms that defied local remedies.

Stricken with worry, Akbar left work, borrowed money, and journeyed to Quetta, seeking help. Yet, at each clinic, the doctors' diagnosis was different from the last-tuberculosis, typhoid, viral infection. Throughout this confusion, Hamid grew weaker.

Almost two months after falling ill, Hamid stumbled upon Sheikh Khalifa Bin Zayed Hospital in Quetta, where he was diagnosed with blood cancer. Although the news pierced Akbar's heart like an arrow, he was relieved to have a diagnosis finally. However, treatment for this advanced disease was difficult and not easily available. Akbar was advised to go to Indus Hospital in Karachi, which would provide complete treatment at no cost.

His family elders called him, saying that if Hamid was destined to die, he should let him and come back for his other children, but Akbar could not accept this answer. He took a loan from another relative, sent some money to his family, and took the bus to Karachi.

Two months later, cradling Hamid, Akbar, with tear-filled eyes and a quivering voice, explained how Indus took them in providing treatment, a place to stay, meals, and transport, all completely free.

"There is no hospital like this in all of Pakistan that cares for people without asking for anything in return. Without their help, my son would not be alive today. I pray that Indus Hospital can continue its work, providing cancer care not only free of cost but also closer to patient's homes."

After months of treatment, Hamid now resembles the playful child who spent days running around with his siblings. Akbar has high hopes he can continue his son's later stages of treatment at IHHN's Cancer unit at Shiekh Zayed Hospital in Quetta, where his wife can take care of Hamid while he returns to work and starts paying off their debt.



Across Pakistan, the prevalence of disability remains alarmingly high, impacting countless lives and hindering individuals' ability to lead fulfilling and independent lives.




A Ray of Hope



Stepping into the Future

"Every day after the accident, it felt like waking up in a nightmare. I didn't just lose my leg; it was like I lost myself too. Then Indus taught me how to walk again. I am living proof that with their help, anything is possible."

In 2015, young Farah was a bright eighth-grade student full of ambitious dreams. She could never have imagined the tragedy about to befall her. One day while traveling, Farah got caught in the midst of a train accident which left her feet crushed beyond repair. At the hospital, the doctors had no choice but to amputate both her legs at ankle level, and overnight, her world transformed into something unrecognizable.

Gone were the days of carefree strolls and running around with friends. Now, Farah was confined to a wheelchair, struggling to perform even the simplest tasks of daily life. The accident had robbed her of more than just her mobility; it had taken away her sense of normalcy and belonging as she started to withdraw from social gatherings, family events, and even her circle of friends, being unable to join in and play as she used to.

Despite living paycheck to paycheck, Farah's parents searched for prosthetic foot replacements that would allow Farah to walk once more. They reached out to private hospitals, but the cost was beyond their means. Months went by as their search continued until finally, they came across a glimmer of hope: the Physical Rehabilitation Center at Recep Tayyip Erdogan Hospital, Muzaffargarh, where all treatment is provided free of cost, alleviating the family of their financial burden.

The Center provided Farah with prosthetic legs and taught her how to stand tall and walk again, something she had once taken for granted. Farah was able to resume her studies and happily returned to school with a renewed determination, turning her pain into motivation.

Today, Farah is a healthy and active student pursuing a degree in Anesthesia. She is dedicated to saving lives the way the doctors at Recep Tayyip Erdogan Hospital saved hers. Having conquered almost insurmountable struggles at a young age, Farah is now living a life filled with purpose, peace, and a newfound sense of gratitude.





The emotions that flood an individual when they discover they are about to become a parent are pure, delicate, and sweet. For Simran* becoming a mother was a beautiful dream that she wished to experience at least once in her life, and the heroes of IHHN made it a reality despite all the difficulties.

Early in her pregnancy, Simran began experiencing severe abdominal pain and found out she had a Partial Molar Pregnancy - an abnormal pregnancy in which both a normal baby and abnormal, grape-like cysts develop inside the uterus. It is a very rare and dangerous condition, occurring in less than 1% of all pregnancies.

Simran's despair grew with each hospital visit, as each one claimed her baby had no hope for survival. Finally, by chance, Simran was referred to Sheikh Saeed Memorial Campus in Karachi - an IHHN owned maternity and neonatal hospital, where she was immediately taken in.

SSMC ventured into uncharted territory with Simran's case, marking the first time they handled such a high-stake pregnancy. The likelihood of such a pregnancy resulting in a live baby is extremely low, with most cases threatening the mother's life. Fortunately, SSMC's staff comprises seasoned doctors in obstetrics and gynecology who undergo continuous training to stay abreast of global advancements in their field. To succeed in ensuring the health, safety, and survival of both Simran and her baby, the team of specialists at SSMC crafted a detailed plan for during and post pregnancy journey. They performed regular ultrasound assessments in addition to routine treatments, consulted with external experts, and studied similar cases.

To help her overcome her past trauma, Simran was given psychosocial counseling by SSMC's staff, who worked hard to prioritize her comfort, standing by her side, supporting, consoling, and mentally preparing her to cherish the happiness that motherhood brings. Towards the end of her pregnancy, Simran underwent a Cesarean section, and her baby girl was successfully born. Cradling her child, the smile on Simran's face spoke a thousand words of how grateful she was.

Considering that there is a shortage of resources across Pakistan, such a trained healthcare workforce is expensive and difficult to come across; however, IHHN manages and continues to do so guided by its strategic goals. Today, Simran and her daughter are healthy and happy - a testament to the resilience of the human spirit and the remarkable capabilities of medical science.




Empowering Communities, Enriching Lives: Unveiling the Impact of the Primary Care Program at IHHN










A Multisectoral Approach to Community Development





The Face of Resilience

Arshad* was only four when the unthinkable happened. His father, a mechanic, used to collect old batteries and store them in a bottle in a cupboard at home. One night, while reaching for a lamp in the cupboard, his father accidentally knocked over the bottle, causing battery acid to spill onto Arshad, who was sleeping below. As Arshad woke up screaming in pain, his father panicked and threw water upon Arshad's face, not knowing it would make it worse. The incident left Arshad with severe burns all over the left side of his face and neck.

The constant visits to the doctor made no improvement to Arshad's burns and instead put a further strain on the family, who struggled to afford even two meals a day. To help out, Arshad began working as a waste collector at the tender age of 6. As he spent his days sifting among piles of rubbish, his skin - constantly exposed to dirt and bacteria - peeled, cracked, and oozed. At the sight of his face, his friends abandoned him; people, including his family members, refused to sit next to or even talk to him, scared that they might contract whatever ailed Arshad. Alone and isolated, Arshad spent his adolescence on the brink of depression.

One day, he met a worker from an NGO who, upon seeing the state of his face, recommended him to go to Indus Hospital in Karachi, assuring him that where others had failed, Indus would help him at no cost. Having nothing to lose, Arshad traveled to Indus, where he was in for a shock.

All his life till then, he had tried creams, pills, and countless treatments to fix his skin, but to no avail. So when the doctor at Indus prescribed him soap and lotion, he felt a small bit of hope for recovery to die. "The doctor at Indus who saw me gave me a small lotion and soap and told me to use it daily. I thought, 'What is this soap going to do?' But it ended up changing my life." Within weeks, Arshad's face cleared up until, finally, all that was left were scars from the acid burn.

"The doctor told me that treatment would take a while to complete, but none of that mattered. Finally, my skin was healing, and I could see my life growing brighter and better. When I visited my family to tell them about the good news, they couldn't recognize me. People called me to sit with them and explain how I achieved the impossible. Throughout it all, I couldn't stop smiling."

After three surgeries and a careful year-long recovery today, Arshad's skin is in the best of health. With the help of the staff at Indus, Arshad was able to find work at a production house and has worked his way up to a senior position. He has since shot several productions for Indus, endlessly grateful for the Organization that improved his fortune.




